KEYNOTES



PHILIP LEE's publishing company Readers to Eaters promotes food literacy and endeavors to help create and celebrate a rich, healthy, diverse, and inclusive food culture. Readers to Eaters has published recipients of the AHS/Junior Master Gardener Growing Good Kids book award: *Our School Garden!* and *Zora's Zucchini*. As a host and producer for KBCS radio in Bellevue, WA, he reported on educational issues. But it soon became clear to him that youth obesity, hunger, and lack of access to good foods are major obstacles for children learning in school, which led to his reporting on farm-to-school, food security, and the local food movement. Philip sits on the board of Slow Foods Seattle and is a member of Seattle Parks Urban Food System.



RICK SWANN, author of *Our School Garden!* will co-present with Philip Lee. Rick Swann is author of *Our School Garden!* awarded the Growing Good Kids Book Award in 2013. A long-time elementary school teacher and librarian, he believes food literacy should be a component of K-12 literacy education. He wrote *Our School Garden!* while working with parents, teachers and administrators to expand his school's garden so that all students could have hands-on experiences with growing plants. Now retired from Seattle Schools, he continues to be active with school gardens through his involvement with Slow Food Seattle. He's a member of Greenwood Poets and continues to write children's books.



BRIAN "FOX" ELLIS is a full-time storyteller, educator, author and free-lance environmental activist. Mr. Ellis will bring to life a character well known to the Pacific Northwest, Meriwether Lewis in his presentation of "Comic Misadventures of Lewis and Clark."

Imagine an evening in Philadelphia with some of the greatest scientific minds in Early American history where Meriwether Lewis reveals for the first time many of the scientific discoveries of the Corps of Discovery. Join Lewis in this exciting blend of stories and song, journal excerpts, and American Indian folklore. Equal parts stand-up comedy and musical theater, this program focuses on the scientific mission as ordered by our most botanical president, Jefferson. Encountering grizzly bears and collecting soil samples, capturing prairie dogs and cataloguing plants, Lewis identified 122 new animal species and 178 new plants. In this original performance, Fox sings the praises of the geology, diverse flora and fauna, and the web of life that binds us to the land.

In addition to Meriwether Lewis, Mr. Ellis brings to life other scientific figures such as John James Audubon, Charles Darwin, and Gregor Mendel for youth and adult audiences. Mr. Ellis has helped dozens of schools plant gardens, authored a dozen books on ecological and educational themes, including *Learning From the Land: Teaching Ecology and Creative Writing through Storytelling*.

HIGHLIGHTS



The recipients of the 2017 "Growing Good Kids – Excellence in Children's Literature Award" will be announced Thursday afternoon at the Hilton Vancouver. Presented jointly by the National Junior Master Gardener Program and the American Horticultural Society, these awards recognize engaging and inspiring works of plant-, garden-, and ecology- themed children's literature. The Growing Good Kids – Excellence in Children's Literature Awards are presented annually to qualifying titles published in the previous year.



Lee Coykendall is the 2017 recipient of the American Horticultural Society's Jane L. Taylor Award which recognizes an individual, organization, or program that has inspired and nurtured future horticulturists through efforts in children's and youth gardening. Coykendall is the children's education specialist at the U.S. Botanic Garden in Washington, D.C., where she has been introducing kids to the importance and wonder of the plant world for 20 years. Her infectious passion for plants infuses the innovative lessons she designs and teaches to children of all ages. She also conducts professional development programs for teachers to help them engage their students in plant-based learning. One of Coykendall's creations is HOPS (Hands On Plant Science), an immersive environmental science program she launched 10 years ago as a resource for underserved youth in the Washington, D.C., community and their teachers.

NATIONAL CHILDREN AND YOUTH GARDEN SYMPOSIUM AT 25

Twenty five years ago this summer, the American Horticultural Society organized "Children, Plants, and Gardens," a horticultural "call to arms." Never before had so many educators been gathered to share their knowledge and skill of teaching children about plants and gardens. That symposium, according to George Ball, Jr. then President of AHS, would serve as 'a powerful seed to create the kinds of enriching environments children need and deserve.' One attendee to that inaugural symposium remarked, "I hope this event can become an annual event where thousands of educators can participate." Indeed, each year since 1993, the National Children and Youth Garden Symposium has moved around the country spreading the message that connecting kids to plants is vital to their future and that of our planet.

NCYGS has, over the past 25 years:

- visited 16 different host states
- partnered with 33 different organizations
- educated over 3000 attendees
- reached over one million children and youth

SYMPOSIUM EXCURSIONS

PRE-SYMPOSIUM: Tour of Portland School Gardens Wednesday, July 12, 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Join Rick Sherman, School Garden Coordinator for the Oregon Department of Education for a pre-symposium trip that will visit three school gardens in the Portland area. Locations include Trillium Charter, an urban rooftop school garden, Candy Lane Elementary, and Lent Elementary Garden. Two of the stops showcase some world-class nonprofit school garden educators that partner with area public schools to create educational growing spaces. At Candy Lane, Schoolyard Farms will share their summer school garden camp experience. Lent Elementary partners with Growing Gardens, which has been instrumental in teaching students in school gardens, as well as adults in their School Garden Coordinator Certificate Training program.



PRE-SYMPOSIUM: Full day at The Oregon Garden Wednesday, July 12, 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

The Oregon Garden is an 80-acre botanical garden, featuring more than 20 specialty gardens showcasing the diverse botanical beauty that can be found in the Willamette Valley and throughout the Pacific Northwest. Our trip to the Oregon Garden will include a specialized tour of the Children's Garden and the Silverton Market Garden with Ty Boland, Horticulture Manager. Ty will share his knowledge about sustainable and organic garden practices and designing garden spaces with youth in mind. We will enjoy a picnic lunch in the outdoor Discovery Pavilion, and provide plenty of time to explore the rest of the gardens at your own pace. Transportation to and from the Oregon Garden will be provided by Best Oregon Tours with tour guide and fellow garden enthusiast Clem Ogilby. On our 90 minute journey to and from downtown Vancouver, Clem will provide us with information about the horticultural, agricultural, and natural landscape that we are passing through.



CONCURRENT SESSION: Therapy Garden Tour Friday, July 14 9:30 a.m. – 10:30 a.m.

Legacy Health, a Portland-based health care system, is a leader in therapeutic gardens. Legacy features Healing Gardens across its health campuses to offer therapy, a peaceful setting and gathering places for events and community walks. Several have won national awards for their healing design. Teresia Hazen, MEd, HTP, QMHP, and Coordinator of Legacy Therapeutic Gardens and Horticulture Therapy will introduce us to Legacy's program and guide us around Legacy Emanuel Children's Garden and the Family Birth Center Garden.



SYMPOSIUM EXCURSIONS

POST-SYMPOSIUM: Farm-to-Table Dinner and Tour Saturday, July 15, 3:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m.

Our Table Cooperative will host a post-symposium farm-to-table dinner. Our Table farms on 58 acres of land located about 15 miles south of Portland. They raise a variety of crops, including vegetables, blueberries, strawberries, apples, and pastured chickens and eggs. Additionally, Our Table Cooperative offers a variety of farm-based educational opportunities for children and adults. Our evening will consist of a farm tour and overview of educational offerings. We will explore farm production by peeking into the greenhouse, pack shed, hoop houses and fields - and maybe even try some berries along the way! We'll also say hi to the chickens, check out the education garden and take a nice evening walk past the pond and heritage oak tree. Along the way we'll talk about what's going on at Our Table and answer any questions! Then we will sit down to a delicious family-style dinner featuring organic, farm-fresh and local ingredients.



AFTERNOON OPTIONAL EXCURSION: Gardening for Wildlife Friday, July 14, 3:30 p.m. – 6:00 p.m.

Spend your afternoon enjoying one of Vancouver's unique gardens. The Wildlife Botanical Gardens in the suburb of Brush Prairie are a cohesive blend of specialty theme gardens, spread over three acres. The gardens, and devoted gardeners, demonstrate and teach gardening concepts that attract birds, butterflies, hummingbirds and other wildlife to residential gardens. Extensive urban growth over the last few decades has had a significant impact on habitat that birds and other wildlife once called home. Naturescaping encourages homeowners to help curtail this loss of habitat by creating your own backyard wildlife sanctuary. Master Gardeners will be on hand for informal tours and answering questions. Likewise, visitors are free to wander, discover, and enjoy the gardens on their own. The bus will depart from and return to the Hilton.


